### Off the Menu

I use raisins as training treats for my dog and he loves them. But I heard that eating grapes and raisins can make him sick. Is this true or is it one of those Internet hoaxes?

Grape and raisin toxicity does sound suspiciously like a hoax. How could these wholesome, enjoyable foods possibly be toxic to a dog?

But wait! This is **not** a hoax! As early as 1999, veterinary toxicologists at the ASPCA's Animal Poison Control Center (AAPC), began to notice an increase in the reported cases of acute kidney failure in dogs that had eaten grapes and/or raisins or currants or raisin containing cereals or trail mixes. At first, grape and raisin poisoning seemed unlikely, but the kidney failure was very real with a sudden onset and often irreversible course. Recent ingestion of grapes or raisins was a constant part of the history in each case. Since that time, more and more cases have been identified and entered into the huge APCC AnTox database, generating diagnostic information and treatment guidelines for veterinarians.

Unfortunately, there is no well-established toxic dose for dogs, but the greater the amount a dog ingests can be critical as well as each dog's individual sensitivities to the toxic agent(s). And there is no way to predict which dog will be more sensitive than another.

A dog that eats (for him) a toxic load of grapes or raisins or currants will typically begin to vomit within a few hours. Sometimes the owner will report seeing raisins or grapes in the vomit and in the diarrhea that soon follows. By this time, the dog will quit eating, will be lethargic and depressed, and he will have a real belly ache. If nothing is done to help the dog, these symptoms can last for several days with no improvement, eventually leading to total kidney failure and death. But thankfully, most owners will bring their sick dog to the vet after the first 24 hours or even sooner, especially if raisin or grape ingestion is suspected.

Kidney damage occurs within the first 72 hours. If the ingestion was recent, inducing vomiting and administering activated charcoal will help to prevent absorption of the potential toxins. In addition, IV fluids for at least 48 hours to flush the kidneys and close monitoring of blood chemistry values are essential for a positive outcome. Unfortunately, even if timely veterinary care is sought, the kidney damage can be severe and potentially irreversible.

But what is it about grapes and raisins that can make our dogs so sick? According to the Pet Poison Hotline, the exact cause remains a mystery. Whether the grapes are bought at the grocery or organically grown in the back yard does not matter. The brand of grape or raisin eaten does not matter either. The region of the country or the world where the grapes or raisins came from does not matter. Toxicologists have screened the suspected foods for

pesticides, fungicides, herbicides, heavy metals (such as lead, iron, manganese or zinc), and mycotoxins (fungal contaminants), all with negative results. Speculation abounds on the toxic principle: environmental toxins, high concentration of sugars, high levels of Vitamin D, naturally occurring aspirin-like substances, or other unknown compounds. So far, no definitive answer. But give these scientists time. They'll figure it out.

Meanwhile, the take home message for us is: **FORGET** the grapes and raisins as treats for your dog! It sure makes that little milk bone treat look like a winner, doesn't it?


